Vicar's Report April 2013

Let Us Talk – from Bishop Nicholas' presentation.

Once again I have to start by thanking far too many people to name - Service Leaders, Churchwarden, the churchyard team, the musicians, flower arrangers and cleaners, the PCC, people who have organized events, our deanery reps, sides-people, readers, LPAs, people who help with the drop-ins and garden party and street fayre and Christmas fayre, the Fellowship Group and Mothers' Union and Men's Group and Bible Study... and everyone who keeps our church running and alive. We couldn't be who we are without you!

Nobody is better at bashing the Church than the Church. But we are still here, and we are still needed. Bishop Nicholas gave a very encouraging talk at the Diocesan Synod – I would like to pass his thoughts on to you, and he has asked for some comments back. What impressed me was hearing such positive things about the Church – and I will pass them on now.

He gives a refreshingly positive view of our place in the world, and reminds us that we are always seeking to understand our place in it, to find where God wants us to be in our context...

The Church has always been countercultural, inclusive and local. Perhaps you heard The Queen praised the C of E for creating an environment where different ideas are possible – so much so that we find it hard to imagine what it must be like in countries where different ideas are not possible. And we are an organization that exists not for itself, but for others...

The media would have us believe we are on our last legs, but we are not. But what are we here for?

Bishop Nicholas' Questions

1. What is the 'Personality and Character' of your local church?
2. What are the priorities of your local church?
3. Is there one thing you would like to take on or develop in the coming year (recognising that may mean you may need to stop doing something else)?
4. Are there ways in which we can work together with neighbouring churches to achieve more?
5. How can we best measure the quality and impact of church life?

Feedback from the discussion at the Annual Meeting 2013;

The church is the focal point of the village. It is open all the time, and people come in throughout the day. People are always welcomed to services – we wait if we know people are coming. Indeed, it is through meeting at church and the exchange of information that we largely know what is going on in the village. It is the source of most social events in the village. It is the hub. The church is what makes us a village; without it we would just be a collection of houses.

This is a big building, and I have said this before, but just think that if we all invited one person to church each year, and that person stayed, within a few years our building wouldn't be big enough! Let's do it!
