


With just a click you can support your church for free!

It costs over £40,000 each year just to keep our churches open and functioning. So if you would like to keep the church open near you, we need your help! Christmas seems a long time ago now, but the message of Christmas should stay with us all the year. At the start of December Mary and Joseph set off around Sixpenny Handley on a journey that brought them to St Mary's Church in time for the Christingle Service.

Our basket of knitted figures travelled to a different home each night. This is a Mexican tradition, called *Posada* after the Spanish word for Inn. As they journeyed, their hosts wrote some lovely comments in the little book – *Mary and Joseph had a quiet night and baby Jesus slept peacefully... spent the night by a nice warm fire... rocked Jesus gently... shared the story with the family... baby Jesus could stay in the lounge under the Christmas tree near our dog's bed. Don't worry, he is a wonderful dog and will keep them safe... celebrating the magic of Christmas... but the only wise man that came was my dad...*

We hope to repeat Mary and Joseph's journey again next year – look out for them coming to your house in December. In the mean time, as we look to Lent, Mothering Sunday and Easter, we remember the rest of the greatest story ever.

Our villages are part of the Diocese of Salisbury. In our Diocese last year: 64,000 people attended services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day and tens of thousands more at Christmas services throughout December. In our 452 parishes, there is a Christian presence in every community.



Over 2,000 people were baptised and 691 were confirmed (494 aged under 20). 150 examples or experiments in parishes with new forms of ministry for mission – including 70 Open the Book in schools; 44 with Messy Church; 20 Cafe Churches; 11 Breakfast Churches; 7 Pub Theology Groups; 5 benefices piloting Energising Local Ministry; and 2 Missional Communities. 42,000 children and young people attend 195 Church Schools and Academies. Ofsted identified 90% of church Schools and Academies as 'good' or 'outstanding'. We have 2,000 Church School Governors.

There are 370 licensed clergy, more than 20 years ago. They include 52 Curates in training posts. We have 22 students in colleges and courses training for ordained ministry. Our highly committed lay people include 871 Churchwardens, 882 PCC Secretaries and Treasurers, 202 Licensed Lay Ministers, 1,006 Lay Pastoral Assistants and 34,525 on parish church Electoral Rolls.

The press likes to say the church is on its last legs – but we are the place to be!

Did you know?

That a girl of 14 may have been trafficked to make the cotton T-shirt you are wearing?

Over 200,000 young women and girls are trafficked to work in the cotton industry in the Tamil Nadu region of India. Female workers, mainly aged 14 to 23 years old, are recruited with false promises of a good job and a lump sum payment under the guise of an 'apprenticeship' scheme called Sumangali. Once recruited, they are essentially trapped within a factory for up to five years.

The workers have limited freedom. They have to sleep in accommodation in a hostel within the factory walls or guarded by the male factory employees with only limited contact with their families or the outside world. They are forced to work often up to 12 hours a day, 6 days a week or more without the compensation they have been promised. The cotton is spun, dyed and woven in these factories to be sold to consumer markets all over the world. It is likely to be found in most of our favourite shops and labels. It is likely to be in cotton garments in our wardrobes and drawers.

It is not currently possible to know which items or which shops sell items that are made with cotton that is free from human trafficking. Most retailers and fashion labels either don't know where they buy their cotton from or choose not to make that information public.

This isn't good enough.

We believe that as consumers we should know how, where and under what conditions the clothes we buy were made. We want to be able to choose Traffick-Free and help change the lives of the women and girls trapped in this scheme.

"Cotton made by these trafficked young women and girls may be in the t-shirt I am wearing today. It may be in the clothes in your wardrobe at home. At the moment we don't know. Fashion retailers and labels don't know. But we can change this. As consumers we have a powerful voice, we can use it to urge companies to change their behaviour so that they can tell us that the clothes we are buying are Traffick-Free. We hope this campaign will make people take notice and most critically, take action. We want to bolster consumer awareness and change the lives of those working in these factories in India"

To Make Fashion Traffick-Free and end the human trafficking of young women and girls in the cotton industry in Tamil Nadu we are asking retailers and brands to take action by mapping and reporting on their supply chain, and committing to the make fashion Traffick-Free.

We are already making a difference with the chocolate and coffee manufacturers, and we know change will only happen when we join together with our collective voices and take action. 


