## The Mothers' Union in South Sudan

In August 2016, Mothers' Union representatives visited the Sudan for the first time in 6 years. Mama Reida, the MU Community Development Coordinators (CDC's) in Khartoum greeted them on their first morning, "We thought you'd never come again" was a phrase mentioned regularly.

To give this some context, it is important to remember that Sudan is the country with the 8th worst persecution of Christians in the world. When Sudan and South Sudan split, Sudan was declared a Muslim State without any Christians. It was only under protestations from the Church that they agreed that Christians form 1% of the population.

Against this incredibly difficult backdrop, the Mothers' Union Literacy and Financial Education Programmes are making an enormous difference, and have done so for the last 16 years! Where women have had no hope or opportunities to work, they are now starting businesses and sending their children to school. They have the opportunity to save their small salaries together and be encouraged, even when they can't get to Church.

Samira is the elected Mothers' Union leader in the Diocese of Khartoum. She became literate in 2003, through a Mothers' Union literacy circle. Samira said that before she felt like she was blind, "it's like my world has opened up". Since then, she has improved her language skills with her husband's help and enrolled herself into a local Bible School, where she achieved her diploma. She now volunteers with Mothers' Union and is an articulate female leader. Alongside this she is running her own small business, which helps support her family.

Church leaders in the area say, "Since the literacy programme started a lot has been achieved, you can see many literate women in our communities and the Savings and Credits programme has enabled many women to become self-reliant, even contributing at Church. When we hold meetings, the women now participate, they have confidence and they are really becoming strong. When we conduct home visits, their lives look very different. In the past, their homes were sparse, and some even didn't have a roof and were dilapidated. Now, they have beautiful homes that they have restored and created for themselves." **From the MU website.**

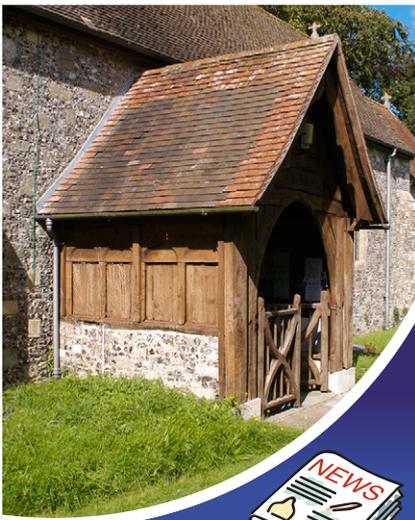
## You can follow this up

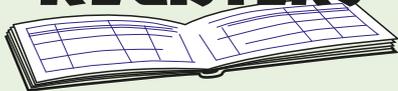

## Dear friends... I WAS A STRANGER AND YOU INVITED ME IN

There is more to say about the refugee crisis than can be covered in a few lines, but here are some facts and statistics about the Syrian crisis.

The United Kingdom has a long history of welcoming refugees. For example, in the 16<sup>th</sup> century 50,000 Huguenots were received from France to escape persecution. There are currently an estimated 117,000 refugees living in the UK, which is 0.18% of the total population. Our government has pledged to accept 20,000 more refugees from the Syrian civil war by 2020. Nearly 40,000 asylum applications have been made already, although it looks like the government may go back on its promise. Since the war began in 2011 a total of 11 million Syrians have been on the run, and 4.8 million have been forced to find safety in other countries. More than 50% of these refugees are children.

What is the difference between an *asylum seeker* and a *refugee*? Very simply, an asylum seeker seeks to prove to the authorities that they would be at risk if they returned home. Their status changes to refugee once this has been determined. These terms are not to be confused with a *migrant*, someone who has entered another country (legally or not) for personal gain, work or otherwise. It is difficult to prove the strict criteria to be classified as a refugee, and only about 45% of applications have been granted in recent years.

For many, the journey fleeing homes and crossing borders and seas is treacherous. The UNCHR (United Nations Commissioner for Refugees) say that some 10,000 Syrians – men, women and children – have died as they attempted to cross the Mediterranean.

You may wonder what life is like for the lucky ones who make it to our shores. A senior immigration advisor from the Intentional Care Network, Rev James Davies, says ‘a hostile environment has been created for them.’ He explains that the red tape is so complicated that he knows of cases where it would be easier for parents to divorce and then remarry later,

because the partner who needs to seek approval to stay in this country has more chance of being accepted if they are a single parent.

You would hope that those who have finally been accepted would be able to breathe easily. Certainly a new life has presented itself, with new opportunities. Yet, can you imagine the culture shock? Nor, as we have discovered, is it easy for communities to accept and support these new people. Increasingly across Europe we have seen negative and sometimes violent reactions to refugees. Germany in particular is experiencing difficulty with culture clashes.

Yet we can all do something to help. The Christian response is clear. Faith-based groups have already been mobilizing in communities across the country. Mothers’ Union, The Children’s Society, Home for Good, as well as many other partners and mission agencies, have been launching small community projects and trialing national programmes. Some of them are aimed at helping refugees, especially families, learn about their new communities and others are aimed at the communities themselves to help welcome those in need.

## TWO WAYS...

The **Rt Revd Dr Edward Condry, Bishop of Ramsbury** writes;

I drove to Sunday morning church recently in a thick winter mist. I had to scrape the ice off the windscreen just to leave the house. The familiar route was changed. The trees hung in the light. Two deer ran ahead of me on the road. There are, it has always seemed to me, two ways of experiencing being a Christian. There are those, who are perhaps very fortunate, who seem to sense God's presence and the inspiration of His Spirit very easily and naturally. There are others, and I am one, who find that we simply cannot summon up God, like Aladdin rubbing his lamp and the genie appears.

This is absolutely not the same as saying that I don't believe. It's just that I don't experience God at all times in all places. So I am one of those for whom faith is a search.

This is not the same as doubt, although for some people it may well be. I'm not talking theory here. I'm talking about experience: what it feels like to be a regular Christian. Someone who goes to church pretty regularly. It can feel like driving through the mist.

The point for me is nevertheless to expect God. The aim is to put myself, if you like, in His way. That's what I am doing when I pray. I don't necessarily experience God every time I close my eyes and put my hands together. But I do hope. I do expect.

It's a continual, persistent, and all-important question. It's like the poet Edwin Muir's meditation on Good Friday:

Did a God  
indeed in dying  
cross my life that day  
by chance, he on his road  
and I on mine?


